

The Baby-Friendly Initiative

Global Strategy to set minimum standards for maternity services to **promote**, **protect**, and **support** breastfeeding.



Guiding Principles

- Inclusive of all infants regardless of how they are fed
- ✓ Evidence-based and best practice
- ✓ Informed decision making
- Supports breastfeeding across the continuum of care through consistency and collaboration

Summary of the BFI 10 Steps and WHO Code Outcome Indicators for Hospitals and Community Health Services

Written infant feeding policy	Education and implementation of infant feeding policy	Prenatal informing of importance and process of breastfeeding	Skin-to-skin contact for at least an hour
Initiate breastfeeding and maintain lactation when separated from baby	Exclusive breastfeeding for the first 6 months and continued to 2 years and beyond	Support 24 hour togetherness of mothers with babies in hospital and at home	Encourage responsive, cue- based feeding

Support breastfeeding without artificial teats or pacifiers

- ✓ Exclusive breastfeeding for first six months
- ✓ 24 hour rooming in
- ✓ Responsive, cue based feeding
- ✓ Breastfeeding without bottles or pacifiers
- ✓ Appropriate use of supplementation
- ✓ Continuity of care post discharge


BFI Supports Formula Feeding Families



All families benefit from:

- Information to make an informed decision on infant feeding
- Skin-to-skin this is even more important for bottle fed infants and mothers
- * 24 hour rooming in Zero Separation
- * Awareness of responsive, cue based feeding
- Consistent messaging from providers
- * Ethical marketing of breastmilk substitutes

Does BFI make a difference?



Ontario data comparing care at designated vs non designated hospitals clearly demonstrates the value of BFI designation to ensure optimal breastfeeding support for mothers.

n=375,859 births

About 7.5% of births are in BFI designated hospitals

MOHLTC Commitment (2013)

Expected Impact of BFI Strategy

- * Increased rate for initiation of breastfeeding
- Increased rate of exclusive breastfeeding at discharge from hospital
- Decreased non medical supplementation in hospital
- Increased duration of breastfeeding
- Increased number of organizations reaching BFI implementation milestones



* Increased number of organizations achieving BFI designation





The Baby-Friendly Initiative (BFI) Strategy for Ontario is one area of investment by the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care to enhance breastfeeding in Ontario. The BFI Strategy will provide hospitals and community health organizations with training, tools, guidance, and educational resources to help achieve World Health Organization's BFI designation and adopt best practices that meet BFI requirements.


Why should your organization become Baby-Friendly?

The BFI not only supports and promotes exclusive breastfeeding, but also skinto-skin contact within the first hour of birth. In fact, the evidence strongly suggests that these activities will help to protect newborn infants from infectious diseases and promotes optimal growth, health and development.


- Develop awareness and understanding of each of the BFI 10 Steps and Who Code Outcome Indicators.

- Learn how to support the nonbreastfeeding mother.





In Development: Crib Card

Stay tuned: Adaptation of a crib card as in-hospital teaching tool (from SMDHU)

Highlights:

- Foldable crib card with 6 sections
- Including
 - Skin-to-skin
 - Feeding cues
 - BF magnet
 - Hand expression
 - Local resources
- Will be piloted with three hospitals following ethics approval.



Start with a Vision

- * What will the outcome look like if you implement BFI?
- * How will your unit or organization be different?
- * How will the patient and family experience be different?
- * What will this mean for your client satisfaction ratings and other quality indicators?

Imagine communities where...

- * Prenatal breastfeeding classes readily available at the hospital, in the community and on line.
- * Strong networks for BF support...peer to peer, follow-up and identified "go to" experts for challenging situations.
- * Women comfortable breastfeeding in public spaces and businesses in full support.
- * BORN Reports show steady improvement in breastfeeding rates for initiation and months after discharge.
- * Organizations achieving recognition or designation for BFI.
